


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English at Blanche Nevile

At Blanche Nevile, we are passionate about cultivating a lifelong love of literature within a rich and supportive environment tailored to the needs of deaf students.

Our curriculum serves as a gateway to wider reading and deeper thinking, encouraging students to explore ideas critically, creatively, and with confidence. With deaf students at the heart of our approach, we ensure that all content is fully accessible through visual resources, pre-teaching of vocabulary, the use of BSL, and a strong emphasis on developing reading comprehension and language fluency.

We also bring literature to life through drama, role-play, and film, offering students immersive opportunities to connect with texts on a deeper emotional and experiential level.

We offer a broad, balanced, and inclusive curriculum that reflects both the diversity of our students and the wider world. Alongside British classics, we proudly incorporate World Literature and texts by authors and featuring characters from a wide range of ethnic and cultural backgrounds, ensuring that students see themselves represented in what they read.

Our English curriculum follows the National Curriculum programme of study and is carefully adapted to meet the communication and learning needs of our deaf learners. Through literature, students explore current affairs, historical contexts, and issues of religion, gender, and identity, all delivered in a way that strengthens their language and critical thinking skills.

By offering a thoughtfully structured and ambitious curriculum, we aim to equip our students with the knowledge, empathy, and confidence they need to thrive both in school and in the wider world.

At Key Stage 3



At Key Stage 3, students are organised into groups based on their abilities and individual progress in literacy. These groups follow the Key Stage 3 English Programme of Study, with some classes using a tailored curriculum designed to meet their specific learning needs. This approach ensures continuous development of skills in speaking and listening, reading, and writing.

The curriculum covers a broad selection of fiction and non-fiction texts. Students engage with whole novels, short stories, poetry, and plays, spanning a variety of genres. This includes poetry, both modern and classic works, as well as two Shakespeare plays.

Throughout their studies, students build confidence in communicating and writing for different purposes and audiences. They also begin to explore English creatively by making connections between texts and ideas and experimenting with language in imaginative ways.

English lessons reinforce and expand students' understanding of grammar, vocabulary, and how meaning is created in both written and spoken language. Independent reading for pleasure and personal interest is actively encouraged to nurture a lifelong love of books.

At Key Stage 4
